Sociology 290 Crises of Inequality Spring 2013 – Tuesdays, 4-6pm, 402 Barrows

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Office hours: Tuesdays, 11:00am-12:00noon and 3:00pm-4:00pm (but check web-site for

updates)

This course focuses on contemporary crises produced by and/or bearing on inequality. Some crises we treat are smoldering; others are urgent. Some are recognized as crises, others require some attention before the crisis aspect can be discerned. We will treat issues around family formation, discrimination, poverty, welfare states, global stratification/inequality, individual and national debt, exploitation, and implications of environmental conditions and resource depletion. Students will write a research proposal or empirical research paper bearing on some crisis of inequality/stratification.

Attendance

It should go without saying that students should not make travel plans that interfere with class activities.

Most of the reading is available via JSTOR or Google Scholar. Articles on JSTOR are noted in the syllabus with a bold **JSTOR** after the citation; those available via Google Scholar have a bold **Google Scholar** after the citation. A few articles are available at one or more other sites if accessed from a machine on the UC-Berkeley network; in such cases either a correct web-site for the journal will appear in bold after the citation, or the word **OskiCat** will appear in bold after the citation, signifying that you need to call up the journal on OskiCat, find the issue and then obtain the paper. Assignments and Grading

There are two types of writing assignments: 1) weekly short comments and, 2) a final paper.

Weekly Comments

Each week each student is to write a short (1-3 paragraph) comment on the collected readings of the week. The comment should 1)identify a research question that the readings for the week raise or imply but do not answer, and, 2)briefly sketch a feasible strategy (proposal) for answering the question.

The plain text (no bold, italics, underlining, colors, and so forth) document should be e-mailed (no attachments) to socpost@gmail.com by 9pm the Monday before class. Place the label "Soc290" in the subject field.

Final Paper

Students may write either an *empirical research paper* or a *research proposal* that engages the literature discussed in one or more weeks of class reading. The paper should address, either as a proposal or in empirical research, a question or questions relevant to one or more crises of inequality we have covered. Students interested in writing an empirical research paper can look to many of the papers on the syllabus for clues as to how to structure such a paper. This resource describes general issues that will be helpful to anyone drafting a proposal. Of course, students are expected to discuss their final projects at an early stage with other members of the class. A synopsis of the paper is due April 2; further details on what the synopsis requires will be provided prior to the due date.

The course grade is based on attendance, class participation, the weekly submitted short comments, and the final paper. Every member of the class is expected to speak in class every class, without prompting from others. Late work will not be accepted. No Incompletes will be given in this course.
